


3.4 Saving/Versions

3.4.1: Creator autosaves continually, so there is no need to use the [Save] button. If you want to save a new version, hover over the [Save] button. Do not do this unless there is something significantly different about an older version that you want to keep.

3.4.2: New versions of your work are automatically created when you submit for peer feedback and when you submit a revised version for possible publication by a publishing admin.
